

Jill Murphy is a children's author. RS have been reading lots of her books recently and it is their favourite author. She is probably more famous for writing books for slightly older children, 'The Worst Witch' collection is one of the most popular book series ever to be written.

I was six when I started writing my own books, put together with a stapler and I haven't stopped writing and drawing since then. I've still got all those early books and they are proper chapter books, with lots of illustrations. Sometimes, I even wrote my own newspapers, with a review section announcing a new book by Jill Murphy!

The characters in The Worst Witch are all based on my schooldays. Mildred is based on myself when I had plaits so long that I could sit on them! Maud is based on my little best friend, Elizabeth, and all the teachers (both nice and nasty) are based on my schoolteachers. It was a very strict school and I

began to think up the story of Mildred when I was still at the school, aged fourteen. I used to draw little pictures of Mildred, with her pointy witch's hat, all over my school exercise book. I made them into witches because I thought it would add a touch of magic to the story.




#### **Class Books**



R1B are enjoying – You Choose by Nick Sharratt

Appealing, highly interactive and packed with details, this gem of a book can support speech and language development, encourage independent thinking and make decision-making fun. Pippa Goodheart's wonderful ideas and Nick Sharratt's unique illustrations are a perfect combination.

1KM are enjoying – Beegu by Alexis Deacon

Beegu is from another world and somehow gets lost on Earth. Lonely and confused, she wanders off to a nearby city to find some friends. But the only friendly people she comes across are the children, while the big Earth creatures just don't seem to understand.

Deacon's simple text and soft illustrations cleverly convey a child's feelings of uncertainty and confusion when faced with new surroundings. This is a heart-warming and satisfying tale that is certain to provide comfort to young children.



4SL and 3/4AP are enjoying - The Nothing to See Here Hotel by Steven Lenton

Frankie Banister and his family run the Nothing to See Here Hotel, which is cunningly hidden from human view by magic and lots of really, really bad TripAdvisor reviews. It's not for humans, you see, and instead is the perfect getaway for magical creatures of all kinds – mermaids are welcomed through the sea door and stairs are rented to ghosts looking for a holiday from their usual haunts.

The cast of characters in this laugh-out-loud first book in a series are full of sparkle, oddness and vitality, from the lisping Molar Sisters to Granny Regurgita, the terrifying troll nan that rules the roost from her attic bedroom. The hotel has bags of potential to be explored in further books, and the offbeat humour will ensure readers visit again and again.




5VA are enjoying – The Scarecrow Walks at Midnight by R.L Stine

The best-selling scare series of all time brings you a thrilling repackage of the field of screams!

Jodie loves visiting her grandparents' farm. Okay, so it's not the most exciting place in the world. Still, Grandpa tells great scary stories. And Grandma's chocolate chip cookies are the best.

But this summer the farm has really changed. The cornfields are sparse. Grandma and Grandpa seem worn out. And the single scarecrow has been replaced by twelve evil-looking ones. Then one night Jodie sees something really odd. The scarecrows seem to be moving. Twitching on their stakes. Coming alive . . .



Year 6 are enjoying – Refugee Boy by Benjamin Zephaniah

Life is not safe for Alem. His father is Ethopian, his mother Eritrean. Their countries are at war, and Alem is welcome in neither place.

So Alem is excited to spend a holiday in London with his father - until he wakes up to find him gone. What seems like a betrayal is in fact an act of love, but now Alem is alone in a strange country, and he must forge his own path ... Brilliantly written and with a real ear for dialogue, fans of Angie Thomas and Malorie Blackman will love Benjamin Zephaniah's novels

for young adult reader.
